KEY KNOWLEDGE

This half term will focus on **story writing.** You will explore a range of extracts from various novels, considering plot, character development, context, character relationships and the building of tension. You'll then have the opportunity to try your own hand at being a writer, firstly by creating a story opening, then later developing your ideas further and completing your own short story. These skills will really help you further down the line at GCSE, as you will be required to write a story as part of your English Language exam. Who knows, you might also uncover a hidden passion for creative writing!

Sentences to practise and look out for

Embedded clause sentence – Alicia, <u>who is my older</u> sister, is already at secondary school.

Sentence beginning with 'ing' – Sobbing, the man banged on the door and yelled for help.

Sentence beginning with a connective – <u>Despite the</u> awful weather, I still would like to go for a walk.
